The EDN is an umbrella organisation for European doula associations and doula trainings. It was launched in 2010 and since June 2011 the website is active.

Goal of the Network

- Promotion of European Doula-Networking and exchange experience amongst Doula-Organisations and Doula-Trainers.
- Promotion of Doula services and doula-trainings as professional work with adequate payment.
- Get public and official recognition.
- Transparency amongst partner Doula-Organisations and mutual support for the organisations
- Establish an EDN Ethic code for doula practice in Europe.
- Counselling for pioneer-doulas who wish to build up new Doula-Organisations and Doula-Trainings in European countries where no such structures exist at the moment.

Who can be part of this network?

Doula-Associations, Doula-Trainings and upon special request and agreement also Doula Pioneers from Europe and the Mediterranean-area, who wish to:

- · exchange experiences with other members
- · learn from each other
- develop trust in each other
- optimize their work by building up national/regional structures and grow in quality and by numbers

What are the actual benefits of joining the network?

- Every member has a portrait on the EDN-Website with link and contact person.
- Members get insight in the European doula reality and into new inspiring doula projects and initiatives.
- Members proove its will to cooperate and work seriously on the doula-concept.
- Members can send stories of good practise to the EDN and these will be published on the Website.
- Members get the email-newsletter from the EDN office.
- Members, primarly the contact persons, get a login to the internal websitespace where useful documents and material are published for download. The use of this material has to be regulated by the EDN!
- Members get invitations to the annual EDN-Meetings where doula-work is the main topic and where doulas meet and share and support each other
- Individual Pioneer-Doulas get support upon request (Mentoring through experienced doula organisations) for building up national/regional structures.
- Members with lack of financial background can apply for sponsoring to be able to participate in annual EDN-Meetings. Every year an other member gets the discount.

Ideas for future benefits of joining the network

- Members of the EDN get regularly an email-newsletter from the EDN office.
- EDN-members should get a certain discount at international conferences in Europe and Overseas
- ...

What are terms of joining the network?

We have different membership categories: organisations/courses, pioneer doulas, friends of the EDN and honorary members.

Doula organisations/associations

- Interested organisations may ask for membership by filling out the EDN questionnaires and by sending an English text presenting their organisation to be published on the Website.
- Each partner (association or training) pays an annual fee of minimum 50 Euros to cover the costs of website and necessary administration.

Individual pioneer doulas

- Individual pioneer-doulas may become member of the EDN but are obliged to work for a national/regional structure in their country and send updates to the EDN office. When a country has 3 pioneer-doulas, the EDN suggests that they form an organisation.
- Individual pioneer-doulas pay also 50 Euro per year.

Friends of the EDN

- Any interested person or institution can ask for this category of membership.
 They are then listed by names on our Website and get the newsletter.
- A friend of the EDN pays at least 50 Euros per year.

Fundamentals concerning role and responsibility of a Doula of the European Network

The Doula

- promotes the autonomy and the independent decision making of the woman she accompanies and supports, in order to enforce the wellbeing and health of the woman and her family.
- protects the intimacy of the pregnant woman and regards all information as confidential
- has no medical responsibility and doesn't interfere with medical decisions.
- honours the work of midwives and other medical staff and also the work of her doula colleagues and behaves in a loyal and respectful manner
- is aware of her personal and professional boundaries and helps the woman with addresses and links for additional support if necessary

- commits herself to improving the quality of her work by further studies, cooperation with other doulas and, if necessary, by supervision
 helps to spread the Doula-Idea to the general public.
